When it's Hard to be Grateful...

As I finish writing this short reflection, Thanksgiving was yesterday, so we all know we're supposed to be grateful. But if we're really honest, it isn't always that easy. For most of us, it's been pretty hard to be thankful these days. Maybe you were let go from your job and you moved back in with your parents. Or maybe, you didn't get that raise you were expecting. Between all the Black Friday ads for things we want but can't afford, and the reality that another year is drawing to a close, being grateful can be hard.

But according to our faith, giving thanks is a choice. A choice that even secular studies have shown is that, if you're grateful, and you make a habit of listing out the things you're thankful for, your life has the possibility of being transformed.

In fact studies show that if for five minutes a day you spend time writing in a daily gratitude journal...basically write out things you're thankful for... your long-term well-being would increase by the same amount as it would increase if your income doubled!

We all think, "Oh, that sounds nice," but right now, making a list of things we're grateful for sounds hard. And that's that point of this reflection... We all need to be reminded of how much we have to be grateful for from time to time.

Here are three questions to ask and consider when it's hard to be grateful...

1. What am I looking at? When it's hard to be thankful, we have to remember that gratefulness flows from the right perspective. But what's the right perspective? We aren't wrong to say that there's a lot of hard stuff in the world right now but there will be hard stuff in the world tomorrow and the next week and next year. But there is also so much to consider a blessing. Jesus found himself in some pretty difficult situations but over and over again he shared thanks in prayer, conversation, relationship, and around a table eating lunch or dinner. Think about that! How could we not be the most grateful people on the planet?!

2. What am I forgetting about?

When we overlook the little things, we forget to be grateful. Aren't you glad you have toilet paper? Running water? A hot shower? Imagine going a week without those things. We can be grateful for a lot of things we have and experience—we just don't always realize it. And when we don't acknowledge the things we can be grateful for, it's easier to complain about the hard things. Gratefulness not expressed is gratefulness not experienced. The more you express gratitude, the more it grows inside of your heart, and the easier it is to express. The flip side is also true. The more you complain, the easier it is to keep complaining. Think about how often we complain and consider Philippians 2.14 which says, "Do everything without grumbling or complaining." Whatever you're facing, there is more than enough love and support around you to eventually get you through - sometimes we just forget.

3. What do I want my future to look like?

Gratefulness has the power to strengthen relationships. So if we want our faith or our relationships with others to be stronger, we need to accept compliments and share them just as easily to spread this spirit of gratefulness.

Here is one simple way to start each day... simply say... "God, I just want to thank you for this day. I want to thank you for the fact that I'm alive and another day was given to me—it's a day I wasn't promised. I woke up this morning. A lot of people didn't. I have legs I can walk on. Thank you, God..." When we do this, we assume that everything we have is a gift. Whenever we begin to assume that everything we have is a gift, we quit seeing everything we have as something we've earned (e.g. "I really deserve this, because I worked really hard for it").

A thankful posture says, "God, everything I have is because of you. I don't deserve any of this. I'm going to view everything in my life as a chance to just thank you and point it all back to you." This has the potential to fuel the direction of our future and the future of our church and community. May the abundant gifts of the holidays bless each of you in their own unique way.

As of 10/31 Playground fund is at \$55,645 including pledge from Endowment.

There has been difficulty getting Children's Sunday School curriculum ordered. Sunday school for the children will start whether we have curriculum or not.

There are four approved Endowment requests. The first is \$800 from the Odds N Ends Sunday school Class to help cover expenses associated with preparing meals for the United Caring Shelter. The amount of \$800 was approved by the Endowment Committee. The council approved the amount. The second is for \$3,500.00 submitted by Patrick Schroeder to support Voices, Inc. for Facebook marketing and advertising. The amount of \$2,500 was approved by the Endowment Committee. The council approved the amount.

The third is for \$3,500.00 submitted by Nancy Dougan and Hans Schmitz to help offset the cost of purchasing a new stove for the United Caring Shelter. The amount of \$3,500.00 was approved by the Endowment Committee. The council approved the amount.

The fourth is for \$2,350 was submitted by Ashley Lashley on behalf of Operation Christmas Child to help with shipping of 250 boxes. The amount of \$1,350 was approved by the Endowment Committee. The council approved the amount.

Good Samaritan Home is asking for a donation of \$2,000 to purchase a new vehicle. Council approved making this donation.

The council approved \$1000 payment to Gary and Staci Voegel for 2021 ballfield mowing.

Kent Mann will work on fixing the gutters this week. The furnace filters have been changed in the education hall basement and in the sanctuary basement. Elwood Deal has the new cover for the parsonage septic tank.


Hanging of the Greens and lunch will be on November 28th.
